Week I	Literacy	Math	Other Ideas
DAY I	Sing the ABC song. If you have Alphabet flash cards, point to the letters as you sing them. Have your child practice writing their name.	Count to 30 with your child. Ask your child to make an AB pattern with two things (ex. fork, spoon, fork, spoon. Or red, yellow, red, yellow)	Watch "Pete the Cat- I Love my White Shoes" on Youtube. Ask your child to find something of each color in your house.
DAY 2	Ask your child to name a word that rhymes with: cat, stop, pan, rug, net, and pig. Have your child practice writing their name.	Help your child count 20 objects by touching just one item at a time. You could count buttons, pennies, etc.	Go on a nature scavenger hunt in your back yard. Can you find: a twig, a leaf, a flower, and an insect?
DAY 3	Syllable Clapping- Ask your child to clap and count how many syllables are in these words: hippo, alligator, bird, elephant, puppy, cat, rhinoceros, flamingo, zebra, cow.	Shape Hunt. Ask your child to find examples of these shapes around the house or yard: circle, square, triangle, rectangle, oval, and diamond.	Play a game with a small toy. Ask your child to put it- over their head, under their chin, behind their back, between their knees, on their lap, and beside their foot.
DAY 4	Read a book with your child. Ask them questions: Who are the characters? What happened in the story? What do you think will happen next?	Count to 30 with your child. Have your child draw a picture with: 1 sun, 3 trees, and 5 flowers. Ask them how many things they drew in all and help them count them- (9)	Help your child practice learning their address and the emergency phone number (911). Talk about what to do in an emergency.
DAY 5	Have your child practice writing their name. Write a random letter on paper. See if your child can name the letter and the sound it makes. Do this for 10 letters.	Search around the house for something: longer than a pencil, shorter than your shoe, heavier than a book, and lighter than a pillow.	Play "I Spy" with your child. Give them clues and see if they can figure out what you see.
